

Historic Hollering Place Wayside

The Historic Hollering Place wayside was completed in October 2010. This viewing area is located along South Empire Blvd/Cape Arago Hwy and provides a place for visitors to safely view the bay. The City of Coos Bay and Confederated Tribes of the Coos Siuslaw and Lower Umpqua have partnered to develop an historic marker and interpretive signs for the wayside.



Historic markers are provided by Oregon Travel Experience through a state program for preserving the history of Oregon's communities. The City and Tribe have contributed additional funding for the project to include three interpretive signs. The historic marker and interpretive signs will be installed in the landscaped areas on the south and west sides of the wayside in spring 2013.



The Camp Cast-a-way historic marker was installed at the wayside in May 2011. The Daughters of the American Revolution installed the marker in the mid-1950s to commemorate the establishment of a temporary settlement on the North Spit when the government transport schooner, *Captain Lincoln*, shipwrecked on the beach in 1852. With help from the Coos Indians the men survived four months in a temporary camp before they left the area. The marker was previously located at 92794 between a driveway and a fence on the west side of Cape Arago Highway about one block outside the city limits. The Daughters of the American Revolution worked with the city to relocate the marker for easier public access.
